

Slavery	A relationship where one person has absolute power over another. They control their life, freedom and wealth.			
Slave	A person who is the property of another and forced to obey them.			
Empire	A group of states or countries controlled by a single monarch, oligarchy, or sovereign state			
Democracy	A system of government where the key members are elected by the people			
Industrial Goods	Materials used in the production of other goods. Sometimes called raw materials.			
Manufactured Goods	Products (e.g. clothing) that have been made from raw materials (e.g. cotton) particularly as a large scale operation using machinery			
Mummification	Method of preparing a dead body so that it does not decay			
Channel Theory	Egyptian idea that illness was caused by the channels in the body becoming blocked			
Theory of the Four Humours	Ancient Idea that the body is made up of four liquids (humours) that need to be balanced in order for the person to be healthy			
Asclepeion	Healing temples in Ancient Greece			
Theory of Opposites	Galen's idea that illness could be treated by using the opposite of the symptom e.g. treat a fever by eating only cold food.			
Manumission	The release from slavery.




Slavery has not changed much over the three Ancient Civilisations – Egyptians, Greeks and Romans.

Evidence for this is that slaves were used for the same jobs in all three of the Ancient Civilisations.

During the Egyptians, slaves were used to complete household activities in the houses of wealthy families. They were also used in farming and to work in quarries in all three civilisations.

Therefore, slavery has not changed over the various Ancient Civilisations as slaves did similar jobs in each civilisation.
