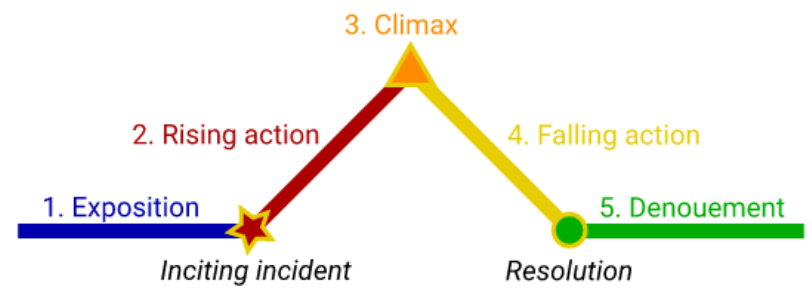
# Year 7 Knowledge Organiser: Narrative

**What is narrative?**

- A way of presenting connected events in order to tell a story.
- Normally contain a beginning, middle, and an end.
- Have been around since the beginning of storytelling, from folk tales to ancient poetry.

**Aristotle: "A whole [story] is what has a beginning and middle and end"**

<u>Types of narrative</u>	
<b>Linear</b>	Presents the events of the story in the order in which they actually happened
<b>Non- linear</b>	Presents the events of the story out of order
<b>Single stranded</b>	A story which is usually focused on a single character, which is usually the main character, they are followed from beginning to end
<b>Multi-stranded</b>	Telling a story from several main characters perspectives who all have their own small story lines within the narratives. These storylines usually collide together and overlap.
<b>Cyclical</b>	A story that ends in the same place it began
<b>Quest</b>	A story in which the protagonist works tirelessly toward a goal
<b>Frame narrative</b>	A story in which another story is enclosed or embedded as a 'tale within the tale', or which contains several such tales
<b>Open ended</b>	The ending is left 'open' not all answers given, often a cliff-hanger
<b>Closed ended</b>	No confusion at the end – everything is answer and 'wrapped' up.



<b>Exposition</b>	Sets the scene, introduces the main characters, time period, and tone.
<b>Inciting incident</b>	The character reacts to something that has happened, and it starts a chain reaction of events.
<b>Rising action</b>	The story builds. There is often a complication
<b>Climax</b>	The story reaches the point of greatest drama
<b>Falling action</b>	The story shifts to action that happens as a result of the climax
<b>Resolution</b>	The character solves the problem or conflict.
<b>Denouement</b>	French for "the ending," the denouement is often happy if it's a comedy, and dark and sad if it's a tragedy.

## Different Narrative Voices

<b>First person narrator</b>	First person narration (identified by the pronoun I) – the narrator participates in the story.
<b>Second person narrator</b>	The reader is part of the story. The narrator describes the reader's actions, thoughts, and background using "you."
<b>Third person narrator</b>	Third person narration (identified by pronouns such as he, she, they) – the narrator stands outside the story.
<b>Omniscient narrator</b>	A narrator who knows what is happening at all times; knows the thoughts and feelings of all the characters in the story. Often linked to 3 <sup>rd</sup> person narrator.
<b>Intrusive narrator</b>	Passes comment, evaluates, judges characters, situations and their responses
<b>Limited narrator</b>	A story is told through one character's experience at a time. There can be multiple narrators or just one, but each perspective is limited to what the narrating character sees, hears, feels, knows... Often linked to 1 <sup>st</sup> person narrator
<b>Singular</b>	One narrative voice throughout
<b>Multiple</b>	Multiple narrative voices

Propp studied 100 fairy tales in detail, he identified *seven archetypes*:



**Hero**



**Helper**



**Villain**



**False Hero**



**Donor/ Helper**



**Dispatcher**



**Princess/ Prize**

<b>Ways the author can 'hook' the reader...</b>	<b><u>Outrageous hook</u></b> <i>This will make you do a double take, 'Did I really read that?'</i>	<b><u>Puzzling hook</u></b> <i>This immediately makes you ask questions</i>
<b><u>Quotation hook</u></b> <i>This connects you with something you already know</i>	<b><u>Startling hook</u></b> <i>This makes you think twice, but isn't outrageous.</i>	<b><u>Direct address hook</u></b> <i>You are spoken to directly</i>
<b><u>Subtle hook</u></b> <i>Appeals to your sense of curiosity</i>	<b><u>Atmospheric hook</u></b> <i>Descriptive</i>	<b><u>Visual hook</u></b> <i>Appeals to our sense of sight.</i>
<b><u>Funny hook</u></b> <i>Appeals to your sense of humour</i>	<b><u>Question hook</u></b> <i>You want to read on to find the answer.</i>	<b><u>Direct speech hook</u></b> <i>Characters speaking</i>
