

*Religious believers have very special ways of celebrating the birth of a child.*

- A boy has to wait a **year longer** before the Jewish community accepts that he has become an adult.



## Glossary for Family, Marriage & Relationships

<b>KEY WORD</b>	<b>Meaning</b>
Family	A group of people who are related to each other, by blood (parents), marriage or cohabitation.
Marriage	a legally accepted relationship between two people in which they live together, or the official ceremony that results in this
Spouse	Husband or wife.
Cohabitation	Living with someone; this may be between two unmarried people.
Vows	Promises made at a wedding e.g. "till death us do part".
Literal interpretation	A story that is understood as historic facts.
Non-literal interpretation	A story that is understood as a myth – untrue with an important message.
Genesis	Means "origin" or "beginnings"; this is the first book of the Bible, containing the Creation stories.
Adulthood	a person or animal that has grown to full size and strength; at this time they must take full responsibility for their choices and actions.
Bar mitzvah	Jewish ceremony for boys aged 13 in which they become adults.
Bat mitzvah	Reformed Jewish ceremony for girls aged 12 in which they become adults.
Rites of passage	Ceremonies marking important events (e.g. baptism, wedding, funeral, bat mitzvah).
Love languages	The belief that some people prefer to express & receive love in one way, whilst others prefer another way (i.e. gifts, time, words, acts, touch).
Arranged marriage	A marriage in which the parents are involved in organising the process in which their son or daughter chooses who to marry.
Forced marriage	A marriage in which the parents decide who their child will marry, ignoring their child's preferences.
Divorce	The legal ending of a marriage.
Annulment	The moment when a marriage is declared "null", no longer exists due to factors such as one partner is already married to someone else.
Remarriage	Getting married again following divorce or death of a spouse.
Roman Catholic	A group of Christians which has the Pope as its leader.
Protestant	A group of Christians that separated itself from the Catholic church in PROTEST at the time of Henry VIII.
Fertility	The ability to have children.
